WELCOME



D arties in Syria continue to disregard human rights and humanitarian law protections. While the Syrian government, with its allies' support, has regained significant territory using tactics that violate the laws of war, areas under its control also are rife with abuse. Security services arbitrarily arrest and torture hundreds, and millions are going hungry due to the government's diversion of aid and failure to equitably address the economic crisis. In Idlib, the last anti-government territory, the Syrian-Russian military alliance still poses a threat to over 3 million civilians trapped there, while the dominant anti-government armed group restricts their freedoms. The UN Security Council's gutting of a cross-border aid mechanism has exacerbated humanitarian crises in non-government areas. In Turkish-occupied territories, Turkey and local factions are abusing civilians' rights with impunity. Following ISIS's territorial defeat in northeast Syria, Kurdish-led authorities and the US-led coalition have yet to provide compensation for civilian casualties, offer support for identifying the fate of those kidnapped by ISIS, or justly address the tens of thousands that are trapped in camps and prisons.

S yria's continuing civil war has made the country a breeding ground for Christian persecution. The economic crisis caused by COVID-19 has only made the situation worse, leaving many displaced Christians struggling to survive. In areas controlled by Islamic extremist groups, public expressions of Christianity are forbidden and most churches have been seized or destroyed. In government-controlled areas, this threat is less, but many young Christians have still been abducted.

no confidence in the flesh **Are we there yet?**

Prelude: In the song at the heart of this letter reminds us that God's redeeming purpose came to us through the unfathomable self-denial of Jesus, the Beloved, for which the Father raised and exalted Him in ineffable glory.

There is no other basis on which a person may claim to be in the 'right' with God. It begins and ends with the love of God, revealed in Jesus Christ. With St Paul, we have 'no confidence in the flesh'! (v.3)

1. Pedigree rejected (v.7,8)

Paul once thought he had a pedigree to boast about. He documents it for us. But since his encounter with Jesus his perspective has dramatically changed. All that he boasted about he now regards as worse than worthless. It was a stumbling block to him. "They made him self-reliant and self-satisfied, content to offer to God his own goodness". [GF Hawthorne]

We kid ourselves if we imagine our family pedigree, our church background, our education or wealth or charitable activities can be a basis for being 'right' with God. Jesus Christ has to be central, and his grace the motivation for everything.

2. Priceless experience (v.9-11)

That *grace*, the wonder of the love of God is beyond words. To express it Paul's letter is full of lyricism, and characterised by joy and rejoicing. He expresses similar awe in Galatians *The Son of God loved me and gave himself for me!* (2:20)

Paul want to *know Christ* (v.10). This is <u>experiential</u> knowledge. McLaren says; *"it is no mere theoretical or intellectual knowledge which is intended. Such knowledge would need no surrender or suffering 'the loss of all things'"*. We are to think of the difference between knowing <u>about</u> Christ, and <u>knowing</u> Christ. The former may be a great privilege, but the latter is beyond price.

"We must learn to measure ourselves, not by our knowledge about God, not by our gifts and responsibilities in the church, but by how we pray and what goes on in our hearts" JI Packer

3. Pursuit of Christ (v.12-14)

- a) What then is the result of the work of Christ our King, in and among us? It has not yet been attained. There is much to be done. There have been colossal gains, but there are also tragic flaws. John Dickson's book Bullies and Saints. We're not there yet! (13a) This energised Paul, and it should energise us. Consider Madison de Rozario and the discipline of the athlete!
- b) Pressing forward for the coming of the king. Earnestly pursue what is right, and don't forget the poor. Longing for resurrection life. In September 2000 Bono met North Carolina senator Jesse Helms... Find out what happened!

4. Prized by Christ (v.12 -14a)

Consider the hymn "Jesus loves me". Yes, Jesus has loved us, taken hold of us! As we press forward in his service we realise that he has his hand on us. We are prized by the Saviour, and beloved of the Father for his sake. It is Job who hints (14:15) at this, saying to God; *you will long for the work of your hands*.

Hebrews (2:11-13) brings the scene full circle, [Jesus] *is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters*... Saying to the Father, *Here I am with the children God has given me*. His people are God's *'treasured possession'* Malachi 7:6 etc.

Though he was in the form of God He did not consider equality with God as something to be grasped He emptied himself Taking the form of a servant Becoming in the likeness of men Being found in form as a man He humbled himself Becoming obedient to death Even death on a cross

To the glory of God, the Father "Jesus Christ is Lord" Every tongue confess that (of heavenly, earthly and subterranean beings) Every knee shall bow At the name that belongs to Jesus And bestowed on him the name above every name Therefore God highly exalted him
