The armed conflict between the so-called al-Shabaab and government forces created a humanitarian crisis in Cabo Delgado (a northern province). By the end of the year, over 500,000 people were internally displaced, and more than 700,000 needed humanitarian assistance. The government failed to provide shelter, food, water, education or health services and many people relied on the goodwill of local families to give them shelter in Cabo Delgado and the neighbouring provinces of Nampula and Niassa.

hristians face extreme violence in the northern part of the C country. Christians have been forced to flee their homes. Islamic extremists have looted and destroyed many Christian places of worship, Christian schools and businesses owned by Christians. Christian aid workers were also targeted. Because of this, it is difficult for Christians to gather-either inside or outside of churches-and it can be risky for believers to speak against persecution.

In the northern part of the country where Muslims are the majority, converts face extreme pressure to renounce their faith. If they refuse, they will usually be shunned. In April, a jihadist group with possible ties to Islamic State killed 52 people, burned down churches and institutions and attacked villages.

The testimony of **STEPHEN**

How often did I sing of the Bohemian monarch, 'Good king Wenceslas' and never thought about the feast of Stephen?

Whatever the date, we need to think today about Stephen's crowning act of witness to Jesus recounted in Acts 7. Luke tells us it came about like this...

1. An accusation (6:8-15)

Stephen was one of the seven men selected to ensure the Greek speaking widows were not overlooked in the daily distribution of funds.

He had shared in experiencing the Holy Spirit gifts and performed 'miracles and wonders' (6:8) which were having a powerful local impact.

This provoked some of the Jews present who were not able to refute his message. From a theological discussion this ramped up into slander. Then violence. They took him to the Sanhedrin claiming he had (i) spoken against the temple, and (ii) against the law of Moses. 2. Stephen's defence (7:1-49)

Stephen's defence speech is the longest in Acts. In it he highlights Abraham, Joseph, Moses and and David and Solomon. He draws

primarily on the books of Moses. In this way he builds his case using "the Law of Moses".

The temple doesn't come into the narrative until David and Solomon. This makes the point that God-was-with-his-people before the temple was built!

A point Luke later builds on (Acts 14:27, 15:12)

Then Stephen accuses his attackers of being like their ancestors, whom the prophets Amos and Isaiah criticised.


3. Stephen's death (7:51-60)

Stephen is radiant with the glory of God, but the Sanhedrin is enraged. He is cast out and the mob stone him to death. With a vision of the glory he utters two Christlike prayers. The first Christian martyr.

The attack on Stephen challenges us at many levels. Where are we in the picture? Change is painful. Could we preserve our buildings and traditions too highly?

God has bound himself to his people, and our traditions are ephemeral, it is the Scriptures, that will not pass away.
